

Red Squirrel News

The first signs of Spring are with us, bulbs are poking up above the ground and birds are getting ready to nest. Squirrels will soon be feasting on buds, flowers and shoots; but spring is a lean time of year for squirrels, with most of the nuts and berries long gone. This makes March to August an ideal time of the year for grey squirrel control, as squirrels are more likely to go for

Drop In and Find out More about the Trap Loan Scheme!

The Trap Loan Scheme is up and running in 7 local areas of the mid Wales red squirrel focal site. The Scheme offers free loan of trapping equipment for grey squirrel control to residents and landowners within and adjacent to the mid Wales red squirrel focal area.

Volunteer Local Co-ordinators have been trained in grey squirrel control techniques and humane dispatch methods and are ready to pass their knowledge onto you, together with trapping equipment and supplies of bait. If you live anywhere between Tregaron and Cellan and want to find out more about the Trap Loan Scheme pop in to Llanfair Clydogau Village Hall between 11am and 3pm on Saturday 7th March for a chat over a cup of tea and piece of cake!

Albi-traps Update



Many of you might well have noticed that some of the components on the traps that you have on loan as part of the Trap Loan Scheme are beginning to rust very quickly. The Albi-traps were purchased in bulk from <u>Albion Manufacturing</u> in September and were already showing signs of oxidisation within a

few months. When contacted, Albion Manufacturing were very quick to remedy the situation, "Our traps are noted for their durability ... we are very alarmed and concerned at your report relating to the rusty components (which) did not come up to our usual high standard. This problem has been caused by the supplier of raw materials changing the coating process without notification. The faulty batch of material has been traced and all components made from it have been withdrawn and scrapped." Martin Nix, Albion Manufacturing.

Albion Manufacturing have now provided the project with 300 replacement traps, complete with stainless steel components. **If anyone would like to exchange the traps that they have on loan for shiny new ones, please contact your Local Co-ordinator.** Albi-traps are British-made and widely used by professional trappers, as they have a good reputation for excellent manufacturing standards. Our thanks go to Albion Manufacturing for providing such a good service.


Training in Grey Squirrel Control



In December, forester and squirrel ecologist Huw Denman led three courses across the red squirrel focal area in grey squirrel control. 26 people were trained up in trapping technique and humane dispatch methods. The courses were very well received, giving people the skills and confidence to join

the effort to reduce the population of grey squirrels in the focal area so that our red squirrels can thrive. *"Many thanks for todays session …, Matthew and Huw were great and the hospitality wonderful. Cydgysylltydd lleol y Cynllun Benthyca Trapiau yn Llanfair Clydogau

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Y tro cyntaf imi ddod i Geredigion oedd dros 15 mlynedd yn ôl er mwyn astudio am radd mewn Athroniaeth ym Mhrifysgol Cymru, Llanbedr Pont Steffan. Ar ôl symud i ffwrdd a dychwelyd i'r ardal nifer o weithiau ar ôl graddio, dychwelais tua phedair blynedd yn ôl pan brynodd fy rhieni eiddo yn Llanfair Clydogau. Erbyn hyn rwy'n cydredeg busnes 'glampio' gyda nhw, gan roi'r pwysais ar gynaliadwyedd amgylcheddol.

Rwy'n cael fy hun yn ymwneud fwyfwy â phrosiectau amgylcheddol ymarferol. Byddaf yn gweithio fel coedwigwr traddodiadol, gan gynnwys bod yn hyfforddwr rheoli coetiroedd, ac yn ddiweddar deuthum yn un o gyfarwyddwyr Coedwig Gymunedol Longwood.

Cefais fy nenu at y prosiect gwiwerod coch am fod cyfle i gymryd rhan mewn ffordd ymarferol. Mae modd i ni siarad am gadwraeth ac am ein bywyd gwyllt brodorol, gallwn fonitro poblogaethau gwahanol rywogaethau, ynghyd ag ystyried a oes perygl i rywbeth diflannu am byth a sut mae modd ei arbed. Mae hyn i gyd yn hollbwysig, ond os ydym yn mynd i arbed ein bywyd gwyllt rhag difodiant, rhaid i ni gymryd camau ymarferol. Mae bod yn gydgysylltydd i'r Cynllun Benthyca Trapiau yn un ffordd y gallaf ddylanwadu'n gadarnhaol ar rywogaeth frodorol sydd â gwir angen gwarchodaeth leol. Hyd nes i ni gael hyd i ateb mwy cynaliadwy, mentrau trapio cymunedol yw'r unig ffordd ymarferol o geisio arbed y wiwer goch yng Nghanolbarth Cymru.

Bydd Ben yn arwain yr hyfforddiant rheoli qwiwerod llwyd yn Long Wood ar 14 Mawrth a bydd yn ateb eich cwestiynau yn y sesiwn galw heibio yn Llanfair Clydogau ar 7 Mawrth.



Local Co-ordinator for the Trap Loan Scheme in Llanfair Clydogau

I first came to Ceredigion over 15 years ago to study for a Philosophy degree at what was then the University of Wales, Lampeter. Having moved away and back to the area several times since graduating, some four years ago I returned when my parents bought a property in Llanfair Clydogau and have gone into business with them to create

a 'glamping' site, with an emphasis on environmental sustainability.

I have found myself increasingly drawn to practical, hands-on conservation projects. I work as a traditional woodsman, including, on a freelance basis to delivering woodland management training and have recently becoming a Director for Long Wood Community Woodland.

I was drawn to the red squirrel project because of the opportunity to get involved at a practical level; we can talk about conservation of our native wildlife, we can monitor species population levels and hypothesise on the likelihood of future extinctions and levels of protection required ... all necessary stuff ... but without real on-the-ground action, we are in danger of monitoring our native wildlife as it drifts into extinction. Acting as a Co-ordinator for the Trap Loan Scheme is one way that I can have a positive impact on a native species which is desperately in need of local protection. Until we find a more sustainable solution, community trapping initiatives are the only viable way in which we can act to save the red squirrel in mid Wales.

Ben will be leading the grey squirrel control training in Long Wood on the 14th March and will be answering your queries at the drop-in session in Llanfair on the 7th March.

Y Bele: achubwr y Wiwer Goch?



Mae Ymddiriedolaeth Natur Vincent yn gobeithio rhoi hwb i boblogaeth fregus y bele yng Nghanolbarth Cymru trwy ddod â nifer fach - ond bwysig – o'r creaduriaid o'r Alban.

Mae'n anodd dod o hyd i'r mamaliaid carismatig hyn,

hyd yn oed pan fyddan nhw'n niferus; yng Nghymru, mae'r bele brodorol wedi diflannu bron yn llwyr. Ar un adeg, roedd beleod yn gyffredin ledled Prydain, hyd nes i goedwigoedd gael eu clirio. Gwaethygodd y sefyllfa yn y 19^{eg} ganrif pan gawsant eu saethu gan giperiaid. Erbyn 1900, roedd y bele wedi diflannu o'r rhan fwyaf o Brydain, ac wedi'i gyfyngu i'r ardaloedd mwyaf anghysbell, gan gynnwys Eryri a Mynyddoedd Cambria. Heddiw, mae'n amlwg fod y niferoedd yn rhy isel i'r boblogaeth oroesi heb ymyrraeth – a dyna'r rheswm dros gyflwyno beleod o'r tu allan i Gymru.

Un o greaduriaid y goedwig yw'r bele yn bennaf, a bydd yn osgoi gwlad agored. Ei hoff fwyd yw mamaliaid bychain a ffrwythau, ond mae'n fodlon cymryd pa beth bynnag sydd ar gael yn lleol. Bydd beleod yn bwyta gwiwerod llwyd – sy'n newyddion da i wiwerod coch. Mae gwiwerod coch yn chwimwth ac yn rhy gyflym fel arfer i'r bele – ond mae'r wiwer lwyd yn arafach ac yn haws ei dal. Mae yna dystiolaeth fod niferoedd y wiwer lwyd ar drai mewn ardaloedd lle mae'r bele ar gynnydd – ac mae poblogaeth y wiwer goch ar gynnydd yn y mannau hynny.

Mae hwn yn gyfnod hollbwysig i'r bele yng Nghymru oherwydd mae'r rhywogaeth ar ymyl y dibyn. Mae'r prosiect hwn yn gyfle i geisio gwneud yn siŵr y bydd y bele unwaith eto yn symbol o'n coedwigoedd yng Nghymru.

The Pine Marten, the Red Squirrel's Saving Grace?



The Vincent Wildlife Trust is hoping to boost mid-Wales' struggling pine marten population by bringing a small but significant number of martens from Scotland.

Charismatic, elusive and running out of time; this native Welsh mammal, bele'r coed, has all but disappeared from the Welsh landscape. Once widespread throughout Britain, the pine marten's historical decline began with forest clearance, but was exacerbated by the rise in game shooting and associated predator control in the 19th century. By 1900, the marten was effectively extinct over

much of Britain, confined to the more remote upland areas that included Snowdonia and the Cambrian Mountains. Today, the marten is hanging on in the more isolated areas of rural Wales, but it is clear that the numbers are just too low for the population to survive without intervention, so intervention is planned.

The pine marten is chiefly a woodland animal and will avoid open countryside. Its preferred diet is small mammals and fruit, but it is an opportunist and will take whatever is locally abundant. Pine martens will eat grey squirrels – which could be fantastic news for red squirrels. Red squirrels are agile and too quick for most pine martens who find the larger and much slower grey squirrel a far easier target. There is evidence of declining grey squirrel numbers in areas where the pine marten is recovering and a corresponding increase in numbers of red squirrels. Now is a critical time for the pine marten in Wales as the species stands on a knifeedge. This project represents a chance to help ensure that this iconic species will once again be a symbol of our Welsh woodlands.

Editor's note: It will take time to re-establish a pine marten population in mid Wales and we risk losing our red squirrels if we stand by and wait for this natural order to be restored. In the meantime, we need to maintain a sustained programme of grey squirrel control to strengthen the red squirrel population in mid Wales so that, a few years down the line, the reds will have become resilient enough to withstand some predation from pine martens whilst benefitting from a reduction in the grey population.

Spot that Red!

Below is a delightful photo of a red squirrel taken by Julian Richards in the Autumn of 2013. The photo is particularly encouraging as it shows a red squirrel feeding in a small hazel copse, in preparation for the winter months. This individual was photographed just next to a large forestry block in Cwrt-y-Cadno, where MWRSP member Huw Denman has been controlling grey squirrels and monitoring the red squirrel population for over 12 years.

SPREADING THE WORD ABOUT RED SQUIRREL CONSERVATION IN MID WALES!

Red Squirrels in Llanio?

Shelagh Yeomans shares her thoughts ...



Our red squirrels are one of only three remaining significant populations of red squirrels in the whole of Wales. I volunteered with the <u>Mammals in a Sustainable Environment</u> project and helped by setting traps last summer; at least 2 red squirrels were found in local woods. I didn't manage to see one but I am determined that my great-grandchildren will have the opportunity to


see these delightful native squirrels living happily in their natural habitat here in mid Wales. There are substantial numbers of reds on Anglesey and in Cumbria due, to no small degree, to the implementation of a successful, volunteer-led, grey squirrel control scheme.

The problem is that, in Britain, greys out-number reds, by a ratio of 250/ 1. They out-feed and out-breed them as well as carrying the squirrel pox which is lethal to reds. In fact, the International Union for the Conservation of Nature (IUCN) includes grey squirrels in the list of 100 most invasive species in the world! They have very few natural predators. We can prevent the demise of the red by reducing the impact and numbers of the greys. It is an offence under section 14 of the Wildlife and Countryside Act (1981) to introduce and release grey squirrels into the wild. They are a long-recognised pest.

I don't detest the grey squirrel (although I do object when they steal eggs and poultry food from our smallholding) but I am concerned that they will destroy our

hard work by eating the bark of the newly planted trees in our mixed native woodland. Becoming a volunteer with the Mid Wales Red Squirrel Project has enabled me to learn how to manage them on our land. If you'd like to find out more please come along to the <u>Trap Loan Scheme Drop-in session in Llanfair Clydogau</u> on Saturday 7th March from 11am to 3pm.

Shelagh is the Co-ordinator for the Trap Loan Scheme in the Llanddewi / Tregaron area. She manages a 6 acre smallholding, which is part of the National Gardens Scheme and has an amazing diversity of crops, decorative plants and woodland . You can pay a small fee which goes to charity to get given a tour of Shelagh's smallholding in Llanio - what a treat!

Making Use of Available Resources



In the Autumn Edition of this newsletter, we reported that top chef Pascal Aussignac, championed grey squirrel at the event 'Taste of London', as the forgotten British ingredient he'd most like to see back in kitchens. Hugh Fearnley-Whittingstall has joined Pascal Aussignac in promoting squirrel meat, putting it on

the menu of his River Cottage canteens and joining a growing movement to bring back unusual game. Joining the squirrel meat advocates is Jamie Oliver, who has featured slowcooked squirrel pie on his Channel 4 programme, Jamie and Jimmy's Friday Night. Jamie advocates squirrel as a sustainable food, eating culled grey squirrels to make use of an otherwise underused resource; the squirrel fare went down very well with his customers, you can view a clip of the programme <u>here</u>. But what if you want to try grey squirrel meat in mid Wales, where to go? A camera trap and feeder will soon be installed in Cwm Berwyn, near Tregaron, in an area where 3 reds were identified in the MISE live-trapping study last July. A local resident will monitor the camera, which we hope will give us footage of reds, as well as alerting us to the presence of any greys so that swift action can be taken to remove them.

Radio-tracking Reds near Cwrt-y-Cadno



During November the MISE project undertook a red squirrel radio-tracking project in Bryn Arau Duon, a coniferous plantation near Cwrt-y-Cadno where 10 red squirrels were identified during a live-trapping survey last summer. The aim of the study was to find out more about how the reds are using this sub-optimal habitat. Five MISE volunteers learned how to use the radio-tracking equipment, and most of them were lucky enough to see at least one red squirrel.

Nant-y-Bai

Results from a MISE hair tube survey last summer in Nant-y-Bai forest, Rhandirmwyn where red squirrel sightings have previously been recorded, confirmed that grey squirrels were present in the woodland closest to the village. Neither greys nor reds were detected further into the forest. Where both species are present, it is thought that greys will dominate the hair tubes and reds will avoid using them, so we cannot reach a definitive conclusion that reds are not present in Nant-y-Bai. The good news is that the 2 forestry companies that manage this woodland, Scottish woodlands and Prior & Rickett, have given permission for WTSWW volunteers to trap in the forest. Matthew Hand, who is the Local Co-ordinator for the Trap Loan Scheme in the Rhandirmwyn area is currently undertaking grey squirrel control in Nant yr Bai and has plans to install a cameramonitored feeding station in an attempt to get a better picture of what's happening in the woods.
